The MatStats Show is Here to Create a Library of Statistical Analysis for the NWCA.

- Mike Moyer, the Executive Director of the NWCA, approached the MatStats gang to create a library of statistical analysis for the NWCA.
- This is an effort to help grow the sport and educate the wrestlers, coaches, and fans.
- When MatStats was created in 2020 (book) and 2021 (monthly show), there was a serous need for statistical analysis.

The Opinions Expressed on this show do not necessarily reflect any policies or opinions of the NWCA. Also, the MatStats guys do not always agree on all things discussed on their shows.

- MatStats is a subsidiary of the NWCA but is a separate entity that voices its own opinions on its statistical analysis.
 - MatStats three hosts, Gormley, Bryant, and Hazard are all equally responsible for all the good outcomes. Gormley for the bad feedback.
- Gormley writes the Power Points and selects the topics. Gormley uses the term MatStats often, but many times it is Gormley's opinion alone.
- Gormley does the stats work and then the three hosts & occasionally guests brainstorm about Gormley's findings and ideas.
 - MatStats is designed to have educated thoughts and opinions to help the world's oldest and greatest sport.
- Wrestling is all about settling disagreements. The hosts are too old to settle these disagreements on the mat.
- Sometimes we agree, sometimes we disagree. It makes the world go round.

MatStats is based on numbers, stats, and analyzation. It starts with facts not opinions.

- MatStats is a numbers show.
- Thus, the name MatStats. Not MatOpinions.
- Gorms was remiss not explaining this from the get-go.
 Gorms lives in a numbers world and is starting to get the feeling not everyone does lol.
- Feedback from the Tribe alumni during this show has made Gorms realize he needs to address this and try to educate people with numbers. Thank you, Dr. Powell, for one of your texts.

As of 12/19/25, women's wrestling is #14 on the NCAA list of sports with most female teams. 2025-26 is the first year that women's wrestling is an NCAA championship sport. Women's wrestling has more NCAA teams than 8 sports that already are championship sports.

Updates "On A Clear Day, You Can See College Athletics."

• Gorms, could you give us a quick update on some major events that we dealt with in our 3-part series, "On A Clear Day, You Can See College Athletics."

- University of Utah approved by NCAA for a \$500M Private Equity deal with Otro Capital for athletics. College President & AD need to make final decisions.
- Otro Capital makes a percentage of revenues (not their profits).
- UU has an exit strategy. They can purchase in 5-7 years Orto ownership stake.

Otro Capital - What you need to Know

- 1. Otro Capital is a private equity firm with roots in RedBird Capital which primarily invests in Pro Sports
- 2. Alex Scheiner, one of the principals of Otro, used to be the president of the Cleveland Browns
 - 3. Through the vehicle of Utah Brands and Entertainment, Otro will oversee corporate Sponsorships, ticketing, and event related revenue
 - 4. Talking about this new investment Utah Trustee Bassam Salem said "are there risks? Yes". "am I concerned? Yes"
- 5. Private Equity will be a continuing and more important part of the business of College sports because College Athletics don't have a revenue problem, they have a spending problem.
 - 6. With private equity investment, college athletics will more and more take on a for profit structure and this means that nonrevenue sports will increasingly be at risk.

In 2023-24, the University of Utah's Athletic Department lost -\$17.5 million.

This loss was before the \$20.5M Rev Share was enacted in 2025-26

It is a tough scenario for this PE money to make U of Utah AD profitable.

- Why would Otro want to invest in a losing business?
- In 2024-25, the U of Utah AD also had a new expense of \$20.5M for the rev share. If the payment to Otro is an interest expense that makes the Income Statement worse.
- The mountain to climb just got a lot higher.

The PE money (\$500M) is equal to about 5 years of U of Utah AD current revenues (\$109.79M).

- The PE money is equal to about 5 years of UU revenues.
- The percentage of revenue share to Otro must be a large number to invest \$500M.
- How does Otro plan on increasing the revenue?
- The decision to split revenue and not profit could indicate Otro does not believe UU athletics will ever be profitable.

Gorms is not optimistic about how things turn of for college's that accept PE money.

- Only time will tell how this and other PE/AD deals will turn out.
- MatStats does not have enough information on the specifics of this deal to relay much to the viewers. It is mostly speculative as of 12/17/25 since there is no historical data.
- Gorms sees this working out about as well as most Hollywood marriages. Lots of media coverage, but not much success.
- Are we at the point where the financial concerns of college athletics outweigh the competitive nature?

- The title comes from the vast changes in collegiate athletics financial situations and how it would affect college wrestling as many of us realize the playing field has changed drastically.

137.5% of all the growth in the number of NCAA men's teams this century comes from D2 & D3.



How much did the NCAA membership grow from 1982 to 2025?

The NCAA Membership grew from 753 members in 1982 to 1,053 members in 2024-25 (44% growth).



252 of 332-member increase since 1981-82 comes from D2 & D3 (76%).



What percentage of the current schools with NCAA men's wrestling teams became NCAA Members this century? What percentage since 1982?

8.6% of all NCAA schools with a men's wrestling team are schools that joined the NCAA as members since 2000. 27.6% joined since 1982.

44% of all new/reinstated NCAA men's wrestling teams this century became NCAA members since 1982. 13.8% this century.



The number of NCAA member school has increased, but how has the percentage of member schools with a Men's Wrestling team changed from 1981-82 to 2025-26?

In 1981-82 48% of NCAA Member Schools had men's wrestling. In 2025-26 the percentage dropped to 27%.

The increase in NCAA Member schools gives wrestling more places to start 2 wrestling teams. Don't let the percentage influence the absolute numbers too much.

- We could simply look at the decrease on the percentage of NCAA member schools with wrestling teams as bad news. Yes, it is some bad news.
- However, MatStats looks at this as a business opportunity since there are more than 300 new members from 1981-82 to 2025-26 that we can pursue to add two wrestling teams.
- With the huge increase in the number of TV stations over the last 60+ years, no show will ever match "I Love Lucy" TV ratings, but now we have so many more choices.

Why the growth in D2 & D3 and not in D1?

 Gorms, is there any reason that D2 & D3 have grown so drastically this century and D1 has decreased?

 Is there a 'what can wrestling do for you' scenario at play here?

- When Gorms starting coaching at W&M in 1984, his ex-coach (Al Platt) and at the time the Assistant AD at W&M told Gorms that at his old school Ashland they were a profit center. They had 40 wrestlers paying tuition, room, and board. Many smaller schools were enrollment driven schools.
- W&M had all the students they needed and wanted.
- Ashland and other D2 & D3 schools needed more students to pay the bills.

Mike Moyer realized that many colleges needed more students to pay the bills.

- Moyer used this knowledge and started adding so many D2, D3, & NAIA men's teams. Then later did the same with women's teams.
- D2 & D3 schools tend to be smaller private schools that do not have state funding. D1 tend to be large state schools.
- Some conferences (SEC) decided to have a smaller number of teams and dominate the sports the choose to have.

Ways To Help Collegiate teams in the new business world of college sports.

- Gorms, what are the easy ways that fans can help collegiate wrestling programs?
- Do you think many teams are in greater need for help with all the new rules in college sports?
 - Are there any Divisions that need more help?
 - Can we help any team regardless of the division?

College Athletic Departments do not make a profit, and the House v NCAA lawsuit makes it more difficult on the business of college sports.

- With what MatStats has learned and we featured in Episodes #45, #46, & #47, the 3-part series titled, "On A Clear Day, You Can See College Athletics." -
- We are in a rapidly changing business world with college sports.
- College Athletic Departments do not make a profit as a rule.
 The advent of Rev Share and NIL make it more difficult for Olympic Sports to find money for their budgets.

The Free Lunch Is Over

- It is imperative that we realize this as fans. As Jason Bryant told Gorms on the phone recently, "The free lunch is over".
- It would help college teams if we looked at this new world and tried to find ways and reasons that having two wrestling teams helps the school.
- In most cases this will be with tuition, room, and board.

Colleges are starting wrestling teams to help their bottom line, not because it is popular in their states.

Correlation between Total NCAA Male wrestlers & Total male HS wrestlers

- From 1982 to 2019 = +0.142
- From 1982 to 2025 = +0.368 (with estimates for CoVid Years)
- From 2010 to 2019 = -0.874

NFHS did not have numbers for 2020 & 2021.

Two wrestling teams are more profitable to a small enrollment driven school than a FBS large state school's football team might be.

- Think about this for a minute.
- 2 teams, 30/team, 50K for tuition, room, & board = \$3M.
- Subtract some expenses for the teams, food, utilities, maybe another prof or two, there is a huge profit for the school.
- If the enrollment increased because there were 2 teams.
- Many FBS schools lose money in Football.

Three main ways you can help make wrestling more desirable for schools regardless if it is an enrollment driven school or not.

- The ways the fans can help would be -
- 1) Donations nothing has changed in this concept. But if schools take from wrestling to pay other sports, donations would be more important.
- 2) Sponsoring dual meets, etc.
- 3) NIL

The 2025 National Duals in Tulsa had a huge corporate sponsor. Corporate sponsorship has become common place in today's collegiate sports world.

- The 2025 National Duals Invitational in Tulsa, OK offered over \$1 million in prize money. Thank you Paycom.
- Stadiums all over have corporate sponsors.
- No reason certain duals or invitationals can't have corporate sponsors.

If you want to help collegiate wrestling financially just ask.

- MatStats isn't just looking for the next huge sponsor like Paycom.
- If you have a corporation and are a wrestling fan, maybe the school wants to sponsor a dual meet.
- You might get this cheaper than you think. Just ask.
- Could help defer a lot of costs. Some schools have large travel budgets and need help. Others are small schools with tight budgets that would welcome your help.

Going to a dual meet or tourney is fun, but it does not really do anything to help the school.

- Going to a dual or a tourney is fun (a lot more fun than giving money), but is attendance really a reason that colleges have wrestling teams? Do schools really factor this in a decision?
- Wouldn't all school have football if that was the case?
- 666 schools with FB/1085 NCAA Member schools = 61% have FB.
 419 schools do not have a football team.
- How do you have a Homecoming without football?

He who troubles his own house will inherit the wind.

- Small sponsorships have an advantage over PE money. The control stays inside the colleges.
- Not to say the colleges Athletic Departments are shrewd financially, you just minimize catastrophic outcomes that come with PE money.
- Gorms might not be a fan of how college Ads are run financially, but bringing in PE money is inviting trouble in your house.

NIL and College Wrestling

How much is NIL a factor in NCAA wrestling?

 Does NIL help the school's athletic department finically?

The vast majority of NIL deals for NCAA men's wrestlers are very small deals.

Only Iowa had NIL deals for women in this dataset in 2024. In 2025 it was only FCS and No Football schools. Very unreliable info.

The NIL system is so new, the NCAA website is just catching up to the new world. It will take some time to have very reliable data.

- The NCAA has some great reliable data on their websites and reports. Over time the NIL data will hopefully be as complete and reliable.
- There are no total number of deals, just percentages.
- When mean > median there is a skew from a few big deals.

NIL is a great concept, but it really does not help the college out.

- Helping a wrestler out with NIL money is a great gesture, but it does not help the college out in almost all cases.
- Hard to imagine that a small NIL deal would keep the student enrolled in that college and pay tuition, room, and board.
- Most college Presidents are more interested in their bottom line financially than winning a game or match.

Summary of Episode #50

 Gorms, can you give us your quick summary of this episode?

 Can you give some examples on how the world has changed in other businesses and yet they survived.

The world is always changing; don't think for a minute the business of college sports is what it was in the 70's.

- Law firms were not allowed to advertise until 1977. Now you can't drive down the road and not see a billboard for a law firm.
- In 1971, cigarette commercials were no longer allowed on TV and radio.
- Only recently was beer available at most college football games.
- Gorms is old enough to remember when that school in Williamsburg was about education.

They 70's called, they want their policies back.

- Gorms is trying to show that the world has changed so much on college campuses, and we need to react accordingly.
- It would benefit the sport if we can find reasons that a school would benefit from having two wrestling teams.
- The more arrows we have in our quivers, the more likely the college will keep or start wrestling teams.

- Anyway that you can help the sport that has done so much for so many of us is good.
- The more you make it easy for a college to start or keep wrestling teams is indispensable.
- The financial times have changed so much, we need all the help we can get.
